As a summary of recent events, we run a support group meeting once a month and we are always proud to bring interesting speakers to our group. In February, we had Julie Pullinger from **Co-Op Estate Planning** join us and what an interesting talk it was, giving hints and tips on elements to consider regarding inheritance tax, cost of care, wills and lasting powers of attorney. Although many will have their finances and estates already managed, it was great to hear more about changes in regulations and ways to consider avoiding taxes when managing your money. In March, we have another speaker who we are sure will be incredibly interesting as she has been integral in educating those within the NHS about Parkinson's and specifically about getting/taking medication when you have to go into hospital. **Clare Addison** is a member of our group, living in the Tandridge area. Last year Clare retired from a senior nursing role within East Surrey Hospital and during her time at the hospital, she was diagnosed with Parkinson's. This led her to work closely with NHS trusts across the whole of the UK spearheading the **Get It On Time** campaign and educating about **time critical medication**. Clare joins us on **Thursday 19 March** at the Woodhatch Community Centre from 1400-1530hrs – please join us to hear her inspirational talk.

We will continue to publicise talks and events that local Parkinson's support groups are running, in case you wish to join. We were pleased to see some of our members join the **Crawley and East Grinstead** branch meetings where **Dr Ian Wilkinson**, Consultant Geriatrician gave an update on the development of various drugs that could help those with Parkinson's as well as other therapies that are now being implemented across the county. The Crawley and East Grinstead branch also held a talk by **Dick Griffin**, former **Royal Protection Officer** to HM Queen Elizabeth II as well as other royal family members. This was a fascinating insight into the world of royal protection with some amazing stories of heroics as well as the human touch of the royal family to those around them.

Lastly, we have a number of fundraising actions taking place in the coming months including

Amanda Cuthbert who has recently joined the Reigate and East Surrey Committee is running the **Brighton Trail Marathon** on **Sunday 12 April 2026**. About us

Our wonderful mum, Mary Cottrill, ran the London Marathon in 2010, aged, 61. It was one of the highlights of her life – she loved every minute and finished with a typically huge smile on her face.

We were all devastated when she was diagnosed with Parkinson's later that year. It has been heart-breaking to see her deteriorate and watch as the condition has progressively wreaked havoc on everything from her muscles, memory and balance, to speech, strength and speed. Even the smallest, most arbitrary everyday tasks now require a huge effort of energy and time.

We are running the London Marathon together in her name (although Andy will no doubt have to carry Nicci from mile 20 ...)

We want to raise money and awareness for Parkinson's UK, who are working so hard to further research and offer invaluable support to the 166,000 Parkinson's sufferers in the UK today. Mum & Dad have benefitted hugely from the nurses, physios and support groups they have met through Parkinson's UK.

Mum, you're the best. Thank you for everything. And Dad, thank you for taking on the Herculean role of full-time carer with such grace and good humour; you are heading for a sainthood.

For those who were able to join our January support group meeting, you would have heard from Rebecca O'Connor about our current financial position. For many years, the support group activities have been subsidised or paid for out of funds received from 2 large donations. However, these funds are almost spent and therefore we are looking at ways to increase the funding of our group to continue all the good work that we already arrange and manage, along with some new activities and events where they would be of benefit and interest to our group.

Finance – 2025 Year in Review

Financial summary key points:

FUNDS IN increased by £4,000 as compared to 2024 due to an increase in Contribution income (higher attendance at our Extend class and an increase in the contribution per member per exercise class) and a strong increase in fundraising activities (see table below).

FUNDS OUT decreased by £4,070 primarily due to the closure of individual claims from the Reigate Support Fund and cancellation of the Café Christmas Buffet.

Therefore, the Net FUNDS IN/FUNDS OUT was a negative £5,000 (as compared to a negative £13,000 in 2024).

Conclusion:

Our Support Group has enjoyed steady cash flows for 10+ years due to two large donations. However, as we draw down the last of these funds in 2026, we are beginning to move into a period of unreliable cash flows. Our aim is to begin each year with enough cash to support that year's planned activities.

While we begin 2026 with an opening cash balance of £12,000, we need to continue to review our activity subsidy levels (which currently are between 33% and 38%), challenge costs and initiate fundraising efforts.

Amanda Cuthbert recently joined the Parkinson's Reigate and East Surrey support group committee. Below you will find out a little more information about Amanda.

What inspired you to volunteer with the Parkinson's community?

My Dad had Parkinson's for around 15 years. At that time, there wasn't much support for him or for my mum (who was caring for him) in their local area. It felt that there was low awareness of Parkinson's, which caused extra challenges for them. So, for me, Parkinson's UK is an important charity that is doing great work, and I want to help with that. When I became aware of the Dorking Cafe (run by Anne) and then the Reigate and East Surrey group, I was so happy to see the support and regular activities that the group creates, and now I'm really excited to help that to continue and to grow as part of the support group team.



Where do you see your volunteering path progressing?

I started attending the Dorking Cafe last Summer, and through joining some regional volunteer calls, I met Hazel and the rest of the committee. I've already been able to help with the group's events which has been a great experience. In the coming months, there's lots happening which I will be involved in - Betchworth Park Golf Club charity day, World Parkinson's Day collection at Sainsburys Redhill, and I am running the Brighton Trail marathon to raise money too. I will also be looking for more opportunities for the group to raise money through local businesses and local events.

Outside of your volunteering roles with Parkinson's, what keeps you busy?

My four kids ensure I am never bored! They have lots of sports commitments, so throughout the football season I can be found every weekend standing in mud cheering them on from the sidelines! I love running - in particular at Denbies and Box Hill; and open water swimming, I usually try to fit in a swim at the SHAC lake in Buckland before football kicks off.

It has to be my kids, they are wonderful, which of course they have largely achieved themselves!

Do you have any goals that you want to achieve in the next few years?

I am in the process of a big career change! My goal is to help people with limited mobility and people with dementia. Massage can help to calm the nervous system and restore senses, movement and wellbeing and now I am a qualified Sports Massage therapist. This is the first step towards achieving my goal and I will be studying for more qualifications from April onwards this year.

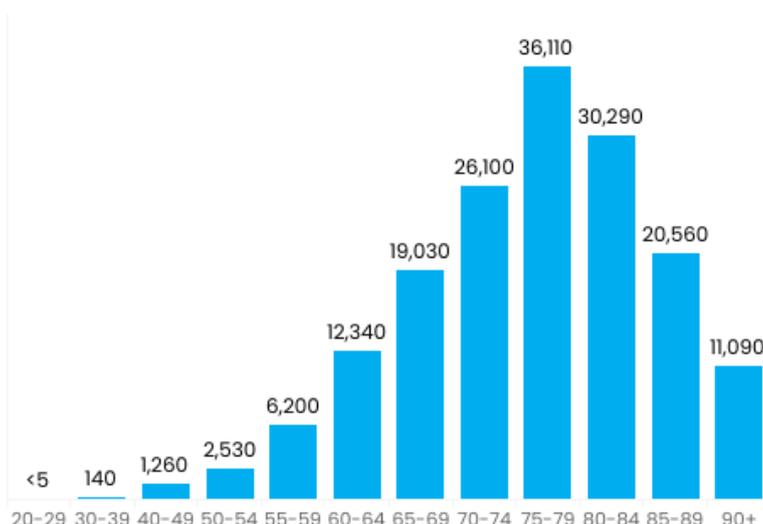

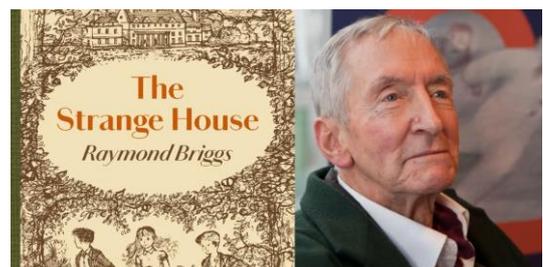

Timeless Raymond Briggs' book re-released to support 3 charities

We're one of 3 charities to benefit from, and celebrate, the extraordinary legacy of author and illustrator Raymond Briggs through the re-release of his book, *The Strange House*.

Republished last Autumn, the early illustrated hardback has been rediscovered by Manderley Press. The charming 1960s story is set in and inspired by Briggs' childhood home in Wimbledon. The royalties will be donated to Parkinson's UK, Rethink Mental Illness and Blood Cancer UK.

Best known for classic children's stories including *The Snowman*, *Father Christmas* and *Fungus the Bogeyman*, Raymond was a lifelong supporter and member of the 3 charities until he died in 2022. We were included in his legacy in memory of his long-term partner, Liz, who developed Parkinson's towards the end of her life. A much-loved teacher, mum and grannie, Liz was diagnosed with Parkinson's in her early 70s and died in 2015. Raymond and Liz's family found our information and support invaluable, both through Liz's illness, and when Raymond himself developed Parkinson's.
